

## Some of the Many Aboriginal Businesses in the Stó:lō Traditional Territory

There is currently estimated to be over 150 Aboriginal owned businesses in the Stó:lō Traditional Territory, a large area from the Fraser Canyons to the outskirts of Greater Vancouver, on both sides of the Fraser River, to the US Border. The businesses are generally, either community-owned by the local First Nation Band or Tribal Group, or are owned by individual Aboriginal entrepreneurs. They cover a diverse range of business categories. Aboriginal owned businesses are the most rapidly growing business sector in Canada, with the 2011 CCAB Study estimates having 5 times more Aboriginal business being proportionately created in the Aboriginal world, versus the non-Aboriginal business rate. Below are a few of the local Aboriginal businesses in the fast growing Stó:lō economy.



### **Bravo Restaurant & Lounge**

## Squiala First Nation / Eagle Landing Plaza



Squiala First Nation has been progressively growing and expanding their economic development resources over the last few years. Most notably, they have created Eagle Landing which boasts many businesses such as Walmart, Galaxy Cinemas, Shell, Starbucks, and many others. Their beautiful new Community Hall facility has been hosting many community and regional events since it opened.

## Vedder Crossing Plaza – Tzeachten First Nation

Vedder Crossing Plaza is owned by Tzeachten First Nation and is located on the Tzeachten lands in Sardis. This very popular retail destination has several businesses such as Save-on-Foods, RBC, Tim Hortons's, Booster Juice, and many more.



## Tzeachten First Nation – Housing Developments



Tzeachten First Nation lands have several residential developments, including Halcyon Meadows, Promontory Lake Estates and several other residential developments, that house over 1,000 units.

## Kokopelli Produce and Deli – The Village at Sardis Park

Kokopelli Produce opened in 2009 and has expanded its store size and services in 2012.

The store now has a larger deli, grocery, dairy and bakery. Specifically, in the Deli; the staff make fresh sandwiches, salads and veggie trays every day. There is a 5% discount every day for status First Nations and seniors 55+ yrs.



## Skawahlook First Nation – Ruby Creek Art Gallery / You've Been Framed



Skawahlook First Nation Ruby Creek Art Gallery has beautiful pictures, Aboriginal artwork, jewelry and more, all done by well known Aboriginal artists. You've Been Framed is a framing business that does customized framing including shadow boxes and more.

## Planet Earth – Tzeachten First Nation

Planet Earth is a very popular local dining experience located on Tzeachten Lands and provides breakfast, lunch and coffee. Always busy, menu items include hot breakfast, muffins, scones, soup, sandwiches, pastries and more, all made daily. They also provide breakfast and lunch catering services to many meetings in the area.



## Seabird Island Band – Gas Bar / ILM Project



The Seabird Island Gas Bar is owned by Seabird Island First Nation. It has a gas bar that is open to all and has a 24hr Cardlock. Seabird also has also a partnership with BC Hydro, Flatiron/Graham, and their own Company – Stoq:ya Construction, for a large work area to service the Interior to Lower Mainland (ILM) Transmission Project.

## Telte-Yet Campsite – Hope

The campground itself was historically home of the local Stó:lō First Nation people and sits along the Fraser River with views of the majestic mountains. There are riverfront sites and double sites available. The campground experience includes fire pits, flush toilets, showers, free sani-station, an ice station, laundry facilities, payphone, and, a covered BBQ area. There are pull-through's available and have 24 hour security, is fully fenced with a main gated entrance. Pets are welcome to this long established Fraser River campground owned by the Chawathil First Nation.



## Sasquatch Crossing Eco Lodge



Sts'ailes Indian Band purchased this historic property in the spring of 2009. Originally built as Fenn Lodge in 1903 as a private home, this 10,000 square foot gem was remodeled 15 years ago into their bed and breakfast facility. There are 9 rooms, library, living room with a fireplace, twenty-four seat dining hall, regulation size billiard table, large gourmet-style kitchen, and meeting rooms: available for a family, group event or business retreat.

## A.J. Towing

A.J. Towing Inc. is a local towing company based out of Chilliwack that has been very successful for a number of years in helping those who need towing services.
